

Report of the Board of Managers.

We, the Board of Managers, in making our annual report, feel justified in calling the attention of our friends to certain features of our work that this year have been attended with especially gratifying results.

The detailed statements of our chaplains giving the number of services held and of the seamen in attendance at them, as well as of the men using our reading rooms, show but partially, with what zeal and ardour our missionaries are laboring. Still no figures can tell the story of very much that they accomplish. We desire now to present for special consideration the following facts :

The Seamen's Branch of the Legal Aid Society, with which we have continued in active co-operation in rendering efficient aid to seamen, has been increasingly successful. More than 300 applications monthly have been acted on, with the aggregate result of \$20,938 recovered for arrears of wages and personal property, in addition to the many fines and penalties imposed by the courts upon offenders against laws for the protection of seamen.

The Society's special officer has accomplished better results each month by reason of his experience with the needs of seamen, his growing knowledge of the plots and schemes which beset them in this port, and by his improved standing and influence with the various courts and consulates.

He reports having received during the year from seamen more than \$15,000 for safekeeping or for transmission to dependent relatives at home. This new form of relief means far more to sailors in a strange port than meets the eye. Formerly their wages were spent or lost in reckless dissipation. They now deposit their wages on pay day and draw a few dollars only each week for necessary expenses, and are not easily victimized, while their homes and families are more carefully safeguarded. The infamous "runners" who formerly supplied them with liquors of the worst sort on board vessels in the harbor, are now kept in check, and "blood-money" exactions have been reduced to a few sporadic cases. The use by our officer of tugs in visiting ships before docking, has been very serviceable, and while costly, your Board considers The U.S. that the excellent results achieved fully justify the expense. authorities have recently recognized the value of our work and have directed that a Federal officer should accompany our agent to vessels entering the port to enforce observance of federal laws outside of the local jurisdiction.

We have not been able to obtain the free use of the needed steam launch from the Government officials, but we hope soon to find some friend of our work for seamen who will extend its usefulness by donating an adequate boat, for use by our special officer and by our chaplains.

We desire to recognize the excellent work of the Seamen's Branch of the Legal Aid Society, not only in preventing and punishing offences against seamen, but also in its friendly mediation in adjusting contested claims between ships and men.

The attorney of the Branch reports that out of the 4,000 claims acted on by him during the year more than nine-tenths of the civil suits were settled by arbitration, plaintiffs and defendants alike having confidence in his just and disinterested attitude towards all parties in interest.

The British Consulate General is entitled to our commendation and thanks for its ready co-operation with and recognition of our work.

Although we have not been able to establish the desired "free shipping bureau," we are able to report much progress in shipping seamen from our "Sailors' Home" and mission stations without the costly and corrupt interposition of "crimps."

We should be glad if funds were available to enlarge our work during the coming year by opening a new reading room in a locality where hundreds of seamen daily congregate, and where reading matter and a resting place would greatly divert them from the adjacent saloons. As such an extension would create a liability of about \$2,000 per annum, we must await the action of some friendly and generous contributor, who will take a personal interest in the establishment of a new station.*

We notice with pleasure the public commendation by District Attorney Philbin, "of the established clubs or rooms for seamen and sailors which have proved very successful, furnishing to such men a refuge from the saloon or bar-room, and greatly adding to their self-respect."

Our opportunities for usefulness are greatly expanding. As less than nine per cent. of American exports and imports are now transported in American vessels, there is reason to believe that the demand for American ships and sailors will rapidly increase. The Navy Department alone calls for 4,000 additional officers and seamen for our growing navy. The demand of the merchant marine will reach at least a hundred thousand more. Our Society will do the work pressing upon it, if the necessary funds can be obtained.

The results accomplished by Dr. J. D. Hay, the medical officer attached to our Pike Street Mission, call for recognition. He has examined all seamen sent him by the Legal Aid Society, for reports as to their physical and mental ability to perform sea duty and their need for hospital treatment, and has attended more than 100 seamen each month, free of charge, in addition to his regular duties of Colporteur. This medical service is a new

departure and yields very satisfactory returns, as introductory to missionary work and improved conditions.

We have lost from our number one honorary member, Mr. J. Hooker Hamersley, who for many years had been interested in our work; and still another great loss came to the Society when its valued and most devoted Treasurer, Mr. John Jewell Smith, was removed by death. So great was the respect and gratitude felt for him by his associates in the Board, that they placed upon the walls of the Church of The Holy Comforter a memorial tablet, whereon are inscribed these words : "Faithful to the End": words well fitted to the man. We shall long and sincerely mourn his loss. Mr. Smith left to the Society a legacy of \$1,000, but no other legacy has come to us during the year. As the work of our Society was. by resolution, unanimously commended by the last Diocesan Convention, it would seem that the clergy and their congregations might well endeavor to do more for our treasury, which is now in such pressing need of funds, as will be apparent if one glances at the treasurer's report. It is not easy to understand why testators should be so indifferent to the claims of the seamen, and so generally ignore them. Certainly the men who went forth upon the waters were not thus treated by Christ. May we not hope that the days for the kindly consideration of seamen will return?



Annual Report of the Chaplain East River Station.

There can be no more interesting work in the world than the work for seamen, yet no description or report conveys to the minds of the people, at any rate of this port, such an adequate idea of its importance to them and to the world at large, as to call forth a response to appeals for support, equal to what is absolutely required for the carrying on of this work.

The great majority too seldom consider and hardly appreciate what is being done. It is amazing to find how few know anything concerning this department of missionary activity. Is it right, is it just, that those whose toils and perils are so indispensable to our prosperity, should be left illrewarded, should be abandoned to the vices of their position, and turned over to the degradation of character which lies so near the abjectness of their condition?

We who are striving to touch the lives of the men who come to this port, need, and must endeavor more earnestly and persistently to interest the people of New York in this far-reaching and ever increasing work among the men of the sea.

Without rehearsing the details of services and meetings conducted as usual in the Floating Church of Our Saviour and at the Mission House, 34 Pike Street, and merely mentioning the fact that the social work in the reading room, in the game rooms, at the concerts and entertainments, remains a very prominent factor in our efforts to attract and hold the men, we simply desire to report the following :

Over a year ago there was organized a society named "The Society for the Benefit of Seamen," composed of women. Its object is to give comfort and pleasure to the men that are reached through this East River Station, and to assist the Chaplain in every possible way. The Secretary states : "The past year has been one of activity for this Society. Seven meetings have been held, a Christmas Dinner to 175 men, and three entertainments have been given at No. 34 Pike Street, as well as the services of a pianist at the Saturday evening entertainments from November to May. A special feature has been the maintenance of the Sunday evening teas for the apprentice boys which were started last spring. Through the efforts of the Society \$223 has been raised, and liberal donations of clothing, reading matter, comfort-bags, etc., have been sent to the Chaplain."

In February, J. Douglas Hay, M. D., was chosen and appointed to fill the vacancy of the lay-assistant (colporteur) to the Chaplain. He came from

Portland, Oregon, where he was in charge of the station of the English Missions to seamen. His several years' training and experience has made him well qualified to perform his duties here. Because of his active assistance and zealous participation in the work, much more has been attempted and with the results extremely gratifying.

The necessary brevity of this report will not permit of a satisfactory description of his especially successful efforts with the officers and apprentice boys. Since March 1st, 726 have been present at the Sunday evening teas and services. Practically nothing has been done for them before through this Station. 658 men have been treated in our Dispensary; 65 have been sent to the Hospitals and 33 examined for the Legal Aid Society, Seamen's Branch. These statistics must tell their own story.

Very many sick and destitute seamen have been helped through the Morrill Foundation and Morgan Fund, and besides through it we have been able to render valuable service to the Legal Aid Society, Seamen's Branch, by caring for men while their cases were pending.

In August the Floating Church was placed in dry dock, and in October was brought back and moored directly at the foot of Pike Street, nearly in the center of the Slip, as may be seen in the accompanying picture. It is in a most desirable and very conspicuous location.

Another room has been added to the Mission House, and electric lights installed throughout the building.

Through our receipt system there has been deposited with us for safekeeping or for sending home \$4,376.41. Many books, magazines and papers have been put into the hands of sailors bound on long voyages, furnished by the liberality of individuals and societies, to whom we are greatly indebted.

It gives us much pleasure to speak of the very cordial relations that have existed with other institutions for seamen and those engaged in this kind of work.

We especially desire to thank Mr. C. H. Abbott, Attorney of the Legal Aid Society, Seamen's Branch, for his co-operation and constant help, and also to acknowledge the aid rendered by Mr. Stafford Wright, Superintendent of the Seamen's Christian Association, who has shipped men for us and has been ever ready to assist in every way that he could.

We deeply appreciate and are heartily thankful for, everything that has been done to make the work of this Station more efficient.



Annual Report of the Chaplain North River Church.

Our Seamen's Church and Institute, in the convenience of its situation, its close proximity to the docks, and in the completeness of its equipment, is becoming increasedly used and valued by the class for which it is intended.

Our men are from the great ocean liners, and the majority from below decks.

The great need of a sailor in a strange port is a personal friend, one who will meet him full of sympathy and kindness—a brother man.

Our men have never shown greater appreciation than this past year for the Church services, for their physical comfort and mental cheer.

Our men have manifested the greatest interest in the work of our Board for improved legislation for the benefit of seamen.

We had three Christmas and New Year services in our Church, with an attendance of seven hundred seamen.

Three hundred and fifty seamen attended our Lenten services; one hundred attended the anniversary services of the Hoboken disaster, and one hundred were in the services on All Saints' Day.

There has been an average daily attendance in our Reading Rooms of one hundred seamen, and at our Literary and Musical Club meetings of one hundred and fifty, nightly.

All has been done to aid the sick, injured and destitute seamen. Flowers, fruits, medicines, clothing and reading matter have been distributed in large quantities. Three thousand mugs of hot coffee were distributed during the winter nights.

The sailors like us. Here is their Church, their Reading Rooms, their Post Office and Bank; here they find rest, recreation, light and hope, freely offered in Christ's name. On Tuesday evening, November 26th, the Right Rev. H. C. Potter, D. D., LL. D., assisted by the Bishop of Nebraska and the Rev. Henry Lubeck, Rector of Zion's and St. Timothy's, conducted a service in memoriam and unveiled a tablet with the following inscription :

Annual Report of the Chaplain of the Coenties Slip Station.

The retrospect of last year's work is much the same as previous years. Nothing startling has occurred to give the report of the Chaplain a spirit of exceptional interest.

· Perhaps one of the most notable, is that created by the decreased population of canal boatmen, now, as compared to the number who twenty or thirty years ago followed the canal as a matter of livelihood. Work that was done years ago by the boats, is now largely shared, and in some cases wholly absorbed by the railroad companies; thus forcing hundreds of boatmen to abandon boating and turn to other callings of life. The seafaring part of the attendance remains about the same; but on the part of all, there is the ordinary prevailing disposition towards the observance of the ceremonial duties of religion. They have imbibed the spirit of the present day, which, if it does not border on unbelief, certainly has that appearance. The spiritual or devotional side of the Church seems to have little weight with them. Their ideas are almost entirely moral and philanthropic. Their motto is, "Do your duty towards your neighbor" and all is well. The worshipful side of religion they regard from a purely sentimental point of view. In other words, they are like many other professing christians of the present time, who have allowed the practical side of the christian life to eclipse the idea of worship. All this makes one feel the importance of a work such as we stand for among them; for our Society is the only organization in this part of the harbor that directly touches them; in a locality of the city where churches are not seen, it stands as a perpetual witness of the Gospel of Christ.

So much for the purely spiritual part of our work. In regard to the social or material side, I can assure you that it is most encouraging; and we believe it to be the means of drawing many of our people to the worship of the Church. They are not insensible altogether to the kindness and comforts, and opportunities for social intercourse which the weekly meetings allow them; and they often show a disposition of appreciation by attendance at the Sunday services.

Further still, we cannot overestimate the good work directly done through our practical efforts. The men who patronize the Reading Room cannot but be uplifted by its distinctly, sober, quiet decorum, and the decent atmosphere of their surroundings.

The Social Club for men affords many a wanderer who is a stranger in the community, an opportunity to pass an hour in comfort, that might otherwise be spent in places of ill-repute, or alone with the depressing loneliness of one's own melancholy thoughts.

In the annexed statistics for the year's work will be found a good index of what has been done.

Report of the Committee on The Sailors' Home.

The Committee of the New Sailors' Home take pleasure in reporting that during the past year, notwithstanding the shipping business was not in as good condition as the year previous, still the number of men entering the Home numbered but few less than the year before.

There is no doubt that the increased popularity of the Home, in preference to the other boarding houses, is owing to the fact of the more liberal treatment given to the men, and the superior accommodations, especially the new bath rooms, wash basins and improved plumbing work put in during the year.

It will also be interesting to know that during the year the Superintendent of the Home received from Sailors for safe keeping the large sum of \$10,625.50, all of which was carefully cared for and returned to the owners, with the exception of the \$626.00 remaining on deposit on December 1st of the present year.
