The Board of Managers herewith presents to the Society its forty-seventh annual report, with the statement that during the year past, there have been held under its auspices 600 services at the three different chapels, with an attendance of 24,090; while at their respective Reading Rooms there were paid an aggregate of 40,680 visits. At the Sailor's Home, the Society's open door of welcome to the homeless mariner. there were entertained 702 men. All this has been done at an expense to the Society of \$12,540.43; but the receipts to cover this outlay have amounted to only \$12,106.21. While a feeling of thankfulness must necessarily be experienced by all those who are in any way associated with this great work, there should, nevertheless, be an accompanying recognition of the fact that even greater results are yet to be attained. This, however, can only be done through a more hearty co-operation by the Diocese at large, through its various parishes, than has been evidenced in the past.

When one considers the thousands upon thousands of seamen who, for longer or shorter periods, are sojourners in this great metropolis-the number of whom is too often greatly under-estimated-and when one reflects that by the nature of their occupation these men are cut off from association with the rest of the inhabitants, and, therefore, from any definite religious influences, except such as shall be given them through the medium of a special agency established for that purpose, it should become a fact recognized by all that such an agency when established, should call upon every earnest member of the community, as a duty, to stretch forth the hand of helpfulness in behalf of a work so far-reaching in its direct and indirect results, and so gratefully received.

It is for this very reason that the Society makes, as a part of this forty-seventh annual report, a most urgent appeal to all Churchmen of the Diocese for the means wherewith, not only to carry on the work that has been done through the past years, but to rise to a more adequate recognition of all the responsibility a Society such

as this is called upon to face and discharge. The reports of the Missionaries, the Rev. Messrs. Hyland, Maguire and Proffitt which follow hereafter, tell the story of the Society's work far better than by any report of the Managers, and make the only appeal

that can awaken a substantial response.

It is with sorrow that we record as part of the past year's history the death of two of the most faithful laborers in the cause, the Rev. Robert J. Walker, who since 1858 has been a missionary in the service of the society and since 1872 in charge of the "Floating Church of Our Saviour," and Captain George Briggs, a Vice-President of the Society and who since 1852, has been an active member of our Board of Managers.

### REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY

IN CHARGE OF THE

### "FLOATING CHURCH OF OUR SAVIOUR."

The past year has been a momentous one in the history of the "Church of Our Saviour." It has been marked by bereavement and change. Its faithful missionary, the Rev. Mr. Walker, has been called away to the land of eternal peace and rest. A memorial tablet of beautiful design, placed on the eastern wall of the "Floating Church," continually reminds the sailor of a departed friend; and calls to mind the precious words of grace which he uttered to those he loved. The Rev. Dr. Cookman, for some time the late Rev. Mr. Walker's assistant, was taken sick and retired, leaving Mr. Gardiner in charge of the work, until your present incumbent accepted the call last November. The Report this year will, therefore, necessarily be imperfect, except as far as statistics are recorded; and I can only speak of those things officially which have occurred during the short time I have been with you, and of my impressions as regards the work and the outlook.

I cannot say that I find everything as I wish it to be. but I hope soon to see all things in shape for accomplishing the greatest amount of good possible. One thing is necessary and certain,—we need the co-operation, sympathy and lively interest of every member of our Board in so grand and important a work of our beloved Church.

I will refer in brief to the different branches into which our Seamen's Missionary Work in Pike Street is naturally divided.

1.—The "Floating Church" services are of much interest to anyone who appreciates the divine incentive of the Church in winning souls to Christ. No one can doubt that much good is accomplished among the seamen, as he perceives the earnestness of the mariner in his devotions; his hearty responses and warmth of manner go far to tell the story of his conviction of spiritual things. It does one good to see his efforts to take part in the service; his attention in listening to the "glad tidings" of eternal redemption, sometimes not heard for months aboard the ships. And again, how gladly they wait after the Sunday afternoon service to receive a Bible, a Prayer Book, or other religious book in their own native language. The services in the Church were transferred to the Lecture Room at 34 Pike Street for four Sundays (from Jan. 18th to Feb. 8th, inclusive), owing to the fire which unfortunately partially destroyed the building, and damaged the organ. The latter, after thorough repairs, has just been replaced in the Church, and stands by the chancel, instead of its former position in the gallery.

There have been five baptisms during the past year, all by your present missionary. Confirmation does not take place until May 24th, when it is hoped a large

class will be presented.

2.—"The Floating Church Temperance Society" has done much during the past year. And did everyone who is interested in our doings, know the nature of the work, and the good accomplished—the change made in the men—they would heartily endorse this temperance movement. In January of this year, 31 signed the pledge; in February, 53; making in all, 84 in two months, most of whom have started out sober, better men. Space will not allow me to dwell on the evils which come upon the sailor through intemperance; how that sometimes he lands with one or two hundred dollars in his pocket, and in two or three days it is gone-led into evil, made drunk, and robbed. Signing the pledge-making men sober-is the first step to their Christian life. Our Temperance Meeting is held every Wednesday evening in the Lecture Room.

3.—The Reading Room has been well patronized,

accomplishing much in drawing the sailor from the saloon to a pleasant evening of innocent enjoyment. On our corners a few doors away are saloons with attractive gilded fronts, all ablaze with light, to allure the wanderer in. Can we compete with such a show and attractiveness as they present? Our Reading Room is in an out-of-the-way place, and downstairs; and yet, by exertions put forth by our faithful colporteur and myself, in January we had over 1,100 visitors, and in February nearly 1,800, making for two months, 2,875, as compared with 3,000 reported for the whole of last year. It would be well, if I might venture to suggest it, that our members of the Board who take periodicals and illustrated papers would send them down to us every two months or so. The Reading Room is an invaluable auxiliary to the Church. Many sailors find their way thence into the services. All these pleasant evenings and hearty services will long be remembered and related one to another by seamen, even in far-away ports and on distant seas.

4.—The Sailors' Home of the Seamen's Mission is well spoken of by the sailors, who esteem the Superintendent of the "Home" very highly. It is a pleasure to meet him and to realize that the sailor is fortunate in having so good a Christian friend, and a home under Christian influence where a good table is spread. Services have been generally conducted once or twice

every week in the "Home."

5.—In addition to the above, we have a very good Sunday School of about 90 scholars and teachers; a Sewing School of 75 children, who meet every Saturday morning for instruction in needlework, and who are presented every Christmas and Easter with a good dinner by one of our ladies. On Saturday evening we have a social meeting of the sailors—"Hope Club for Men,"—coffee and cake driving dull care away. There are other auxiliaries, such as "The Woman's Hope Club," and the "Teachers' Meetings," etc., which ought to be mentioned.

I cannot help but feel much satisfaction at the outlook, and especially so, if we receive due encouragement and support; and I know it could not be otherwise

were it possible for our friends to see the daily routine of work. May God bless and prosper our undertaking is the sincere wish of your missionary.

Besides the "Sailors' Home" of the "Seamen's Mission," there is also the "Old Sailors' Home" on Cherry Street, of which Mr. Alexander is Superintendent. Here many sailors board while in port. There are also about fifty boarding houses of all grades, which accommodate from five to twenty-five sailors each. About thirty-five of these are constantly visited, the remainder being saloons, which are unpleasant, if not almost dangerous to enter. Visiting these places is a prominent feature of our work, and might be mentioned as the most unpleasant. In some of them we are received very kindly, while in others it is very uncertain and sometimes disagreeable.

I have procured admission of two seamen to the hospital at different times—one sick with consumption, sent to Bellevue; another afflicted with severe rheumatism, sent to St. Luke's. I have also visited the Marine Hospital, Staten Island, where I was called to minister to several sick sailors, one of whom was dying; all of them having attended the "Floating Church" and Reading Room in Pike Street.

There are many incidents connected with the sailors which are interesting. One which especially made an impression on me was the appearance among us of a sailor, one of a few who escaped from the recent wreck on Fire Island. This man signed the pledge in our Temperance Society, and started out on an earnest Christian life

### REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY

IN CHARGE OF THE

CHURCH OF THE HOLY COMFORTER FOR SAILORS.

Your Missionary is happy to be able to report that during the past year the services of the Church have been well attended and greatly appreciated. The congregations are reverent and devout, and join heartily in the hymns and responses. While a small proportion of the worshippers are churchmen, yet they conform readily and devoutly to our peculiar mode of worship.

At the close of the second service on the Lord's Day we have an After-meeting which lasts about thirty minutes. At this service familiar hymns are sung, such as "Pull for the Shore" and "Rescue the Perishing." Sailors join in singing these hymns with great delight and earnestness. An opportunity is also given them to sign the Temperance Pledge. At these meetings many Christian sailors testify to the saving power of Divine grace, and not a few are strengthened and encouraged in their religious life by the earnest words spoken by the men of the sea.

The Reading-Room continues to be well attended, and shows considerable gain over last year, when it touched high water mark. But this year it has gone beyond that, and the mark must be moved up several figures. Last year there were 18,416 visits made to the Reading Room. This year 21,567 visits, showing an increase of 3,151. This gain is attributed in a great measure, to the fact that a generous member of this Board has regularly, for the past twelve months, supplied the Reading Room with the leading magazines and the illustrated and daily papers, both foreign and domestic. This

adds very considerably to its attractiveness and usefulness. It is not easy to calculate the good this auxiliary to the Mission is doing. It certainly is very great. It keeps hundreds, and perhaps thousands, out of the saloons that are so near and so alluring, and it affords the men a comfortable and agreeable place to spend their evenings. Innocent games are furnished for their amusement, and writing material, without charge, for those who wish to write to loved ones far away. Many avail themselves of this privilege, and thousands of letters are written annually at this Reading Room by seamen.

The Temperance work of this Mission is carried on as heretofore, and is doing much good. Hundreds have been reformed through this instrumentality, and to-day are rejoicing in their sober and improved condition. It is true that some of those who sign do not keep their pledge, but many do; and this is no little encouragement to persevere in this good work. Some of those who violate their pledge, confess their failure and sign again. I had an instance of this lately. A seaman signed five years ago in the Mission, and in a moment of temptation broke his pledge, and then came forward and signed for life. If a man with a large family, as in this case, can be kept from the use of intoxicating liquors for five years, certainly a great good has been accomplished. Many other cases of a similar character have come under my observation. Some keep their pledge for a shorter time. But in every case good is done, and that justifies the effort and is an encouragement to persevere. Not a few to my knowledge have kept their pledge for years. Men who were a terror to all about them have, through this instrumentality, become a blessing. A Temperance Book of Remembrance is kept, in which the names of all who sign are registered. This is useful for reference and is quite a curiositv.

The Sunday School is about the same in numbers and efficiency as in former years. Much good is accomplished through this agency, as many of the children would probably otherwise grow up without any religious instruction. Children from the boats and barges in the

vicinity come to the school occasionally. They cannot come with any degree of regularity as the boats are continually shifting from place to place. But when they can come, they are glad to do so, and feel at home, as they understand the Mission is for their benefit. To find teachers for such a school as this, located on the river front is no easy task. Kind and loving hearts, however, have volunteered for this duty, and their patience and self-denial is deserving of all praise.

The Sewing School, started some three years ago by Mrs. Frances A. Ludlum, is still carried on by the same estimable lady, assisted by Miss Bloodgood and a few others. This school meets every Saturday afternoon during the Fall, Winter, and early Spring months. It has done much good in teaching the children the use of the needle in making their own garments. The ladies who carry on this work deserve great credit. Their labor is truly one of love and self-denial, and ought to have encouragement from every friend of the poor.

Another form of good done by this Mission is the distribution of books to seamen. This, though last mentioned, is by no means the least in importance. It is almost impossible to estimate the far-reaching influence of a good book. The books given away in this Mission have blessed thousands of lives. Not only have they proved a comfort and a help to men when on the bosom of the deep, but they are also enjoyed by their families. For this means of usefulness our thanks are due, and are hereby tendered to one whose unfailing liberality has proved him to be the sailor's friend and benefactor.

I am thankful to say the work of this station is in a most prosperous condition. Never in its long history has its usefulness been more felt than it is to-day, and never have its benefits been more gratefully appreciated and enjoyed.

### REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY

IN CHARGE OF THE

### COENTIES SLIP STATION.

It is difficult to give a complete and adequate idea of the work of this mission within the compass of two or three pages of the Society's report. Brevity must preclude the most characteristic incidents in the work of your missionary. Sufficient, therefore, to state, that it has produced happy and permanent results in the many cases which have come to his knowledge.

The five thousand five hundred boats engaged in the commerce of the canals and rivers of the State give employment to about twenty thousand men. It is not above the truth to state, that forty thousand persons are entirely dependent for support from the traffic of our inland water ways. I had the privilege of addressing nearly eight thousand of these during the last year at the various religious services of the Mission.

The character of their business excludes them from the many religious privileges which we enjoy on land. About four-fifths of them are American born citizens, they are not ignorant, as some persons erroneously imagine, they know their own business thoroughly, they are intelligent, honest, industrious, independent, selfreliant, generous and accommodating to those who treat them with justice and respect.

These people are "my charge." I am personally acquainted with seven hundred families; I baptize their children; visit their sick; marry their sons and daughters, and bury their dead. I have been doing so for nineteen years, and rejoice and thank God that he has graciously

permitted me to give the best years of my life to this work. I am satisfied; yet I am constrained to ask for more help, that the work in which we are all so interested may be done more effectually. Shall they not have a spiritual home, a comfortable, inexpensive church building, where they may come and worship God?

Your missionary earnestly desires that the Board of Managers would give this subject their most thoughtful consideration. The work of the Station in its various branches during the past year reached the usual proportions. The Sunday services on the pier attracted large and attentive audiences, sometimes amounting to hundreds. On the Sunday afternoon last June when the Bishop of the Diocese made his visitation, there was a congregation of three hundred persons present who listened with absorbed attention to the words of edification which he addressed to them. Similar respect and attention are marked features of the in-door services.

The Reading Room continues in successful operation. It is usual to see as many as twenty-five, sometimes thirty men engaged in reading and writing on any forenoon during the past winter.

About eight thousand visits were made by your missionary and his colporteur to the various craft engaged in the commerce of the harbor, reading the word of God when the opportunity offered, distributing tracts and conversing with those who were willing to listen or talk; endeavoring in these various ways to carry out the purposes of the society, and fulfill the duties of his office.

The distribution of good reading matter has always formed a very important element in the work of the station; but this has been greatly curtailed last year for want of funds with which to purchase books and papers.
